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Exciting Times Are Here

am pleased to report that the state of the arts in Singapore is robust and healthy. The arts scene saw unprecedented verve and vitality in 2006. A sharp rise in exhibition days, coupled with steady growth in performances, boosted the number of arts activities past the 20,000 mark. This meant some 60 activities a day to keep Singaporeans and visitors engaged and excited. Ticketed performances drew in close to 1.3 million attendees. Some 70 new arts companies were registered, bringing the total number to 730.

New institutions and facilities are emerging to enrich the arts scene. In 2008, the School of the Arts will open its doors, offering an integrated arts and academic curriculum to secondary school students. Plans are underway to convert City Hall and the former Supreme Court into the National Art Gallery of Singapore. The gallery will be a visual arts institution dedicated to Southeast Asian art, and will play host to international art exhibitions. A high-security repository for artefacts and paintings, to be operated by The Ultimate Freeport, will attract private art collectors, art dealers and institutions, such as auction houses and museums, to Singapore with its integrated high-value asset free enterprise solutions. It will be an important infrastructure in Singapore's development as a regional and international visual arts centre.

Increasingly, the world is taking notice of us. Singapore artists now garner close to 90 international engagements and accolades yearly. Our artists are sought-after globally for residencies, commissions and collaborations. In 2006, they engaged audiences in Hong Kong, Tokyo, Frankfurt, New York and many other cities.

Arts and tourism come together with the Convene-in-Singapore scheme – an assistance programme for the local arts industry to host international arts conferences and meetings in Singapore. This NAC and Singapore Tourism Board joint initiative has funded and facilitated 12 conferences and meetings to date. We have secured the hosting rights for prestigious conferences such as the International Symposium on Electronic Art in 2008 and the International Trombone Festival in 2010.

To facilitate exchanges and inter-agency cooperation, the Council leverages on the many Memoranda of Understanding signed with key arts agencies such as Arts Victoria, Arts Council England and the Scottish Art Council.

NAC continues its efforts to engage in cultural

diplomacy with the planning of the second edition of Singapore Season, a multi-agency effort to showcase Singapore's artistic and cultural achievements in key global cities. The Season presents a new face of Singapore – a city driven by imagination, creativity and innovation. In October 2007, Singapore Season travels to Beijing and Shanghai, partnering some of China's most prestigious festivals and leading cultural and educational institutions.

There were some 3,520 free outreach activities organised by various organisations last year. The Council works in tandem with arts advocates to bring the arts closer to the wider community. Two new Memoranda of Understanding were signed – one with the People's Association and the other with the Republic Polytechnic. These strategic alliances enable us to develop community talent, grow arts interest groups and create platforms for deeper community engagement.

NAC has also been working with social partners to enhance physical, social and emotional wellbeing, by tapping on the therapeutic qualities of the arts. One interesting project was the crystal glass installation entitled the 'Healing Sky Garden' at Tan Tock Seng Hospital's atrium, which helps uplift the spirits of patients seeking solace. Other social programmes that involved art activities included *The Yellow Ribbon Project* and batik workshops in prisons. In addition, the Council collaborated with the Central Narcotics Bureau on *Danceworks!*, to drive home its message for the 'Say No to Drugs' campaign.

For the arts to continue thriving in this city, the business community has to get behind it. I am glad to note that more businesses are doing that. In 2006, arts sponsors provided priceless support – to the tune of \$33.5 million in cash and in kind from 265 individuals and corporations.

In the years ahead, NAC will focus on more private-people-public collaborations to grow our artistic landscape into a key driver of the creative cluster. These are exciting times. I welcome our new Council members – Prof Jeremy Monteiro, Ong Keng Sen, Sarkasi Said, Hsieh Fu Hua, Vera Ong and Ng Cher Pong – and thank those who have just retired – Albert Chua, Paul Joseph Lawrence, Matthew Ngui, Noor Effendy Bin Ibrahim, Lawrence Leow and Iskandar Jalil.

As we push on, we are encouraged that our work will enrich the lives of many, help shape the uniqueness of this country and contribute to the socio-economic development of Singapore.

Firing on All Fronts

n 2006 we made significant progress on all fronts – with the artists, the private corporations and the public. It was a year that saw a deepening engagement in the arts and an increasing sophistication in its creations that led to excellence – both locally and internationally.

High on our priority list was to bring out the arts in artists – energising the supply side, as it were. The council provided substantial financial support of \$12.7 million to artists and arts groups in the performing, visual and literary arts through direct grants, scholarships and bursaries, commissions, art housing subsidies and international showcasing grants. The emphasis was on supporting quality local works. New initiatives launched include the setting up of the Writers Resource Centre, research for ethnic arts and an online dance resource portal.

We continued to raise the profile of our artists who have excelled and give them the recognition they deserve. For the first time, the Cultural Medallion was presented by President S R Nathan, elevating the prestige of the national award. The sum for the Cultural Medallion grant was increased to \$80,000.

To identify and nurture promising young musicians, we continued to organise music competitions. The National Indian Music Competition, Singapore's biggest Indian music platform, attracted 121 entrants. The National Chinese Music Competition received a record 265 entries.

Besides bringing out the arts in artists, we worked hard to bring out the arts in people – boosting the demand side.

New heights were reached in the outreach programmes. The NAC-ExxonMobil Concert in the Park, an iconic series that has played a pioneering role in bringing arts to the people, celebrated its 10th anniversary. Newer platforms, such as Noise Singapore, featuring more than 1,000 art, design, music and photography works in new media, reached a younger audience by getting them involved in art-making themselves.

Arts education in schools continued to thrive. There was a 45% increase in applications for the National Arts Education Award, a sign that more secondary schools are providing their students a more holistic education.

Of course, it was our strategic mega events that played a big role in bringing out the arts in everyone, everywhere.

The loudest drum roll must go to the inaugural Singapore Biennale. The event was undoubtedly Singapore's premier international contemporary art event and largest visual arts extravaganza. Featuring works by 95 local and international artists across 19 venues, it generated much buzz, attracted 883,300 people and received rave reviews. More than half of the Singapore artists who participated in the biennale were subsequently invited to showcase their works in other international biennales and exhibitions. The biennale was a significant milestone in the development of visual arts in Singapore.

The Singapore Arts Festival 2006 was another crowd-puller, reaching a total of 522,700 audiences through its Core and Outreach Programmes. The annual spectacular brought an international spread of quality arts productions to Singapore – with more than 1,700 artists in 24 main productions and over 400 free performances, exhibitions and special events. Strong attendance prevailed at the core productions, which recorded an overall house of 80.3% with 23 performances sold out.

My deep appreciation goes to all the artists, arts organisations, sponsors, business partners and stakeholders, without whom we could not have come so far. I would also like to thank our Council members and the senior management and staff of NAC for their commitment to the promotion of the arts.

he National Arts Council (NAC) was set up as a statutory board in September 1991 to spearhead the development of the arts in Singapore.

Anchored on the twin strategies of excellence and engagement in the arts, the Council aims to build a vibrant arts sector by creating a conducive environment where the arts is accessible to all and artistic talents have the necessary resources and capabilities to excel and achieve sustainability in the long term.

NAC focuses on five key strategic thrusts: Nurture and develop the arts; Develop capabilities and resources; Stimulate broader and more sophisticated audience demand; Facilitate internationalisation and enhance global connectivity; Advocate the importance of the arts.

To develop artistic talents in the performing, visual and literary arts, the Council provides total support through grants, training, arts housing subsidies, commissioning of works and overseas presentations. It adopts a holistic approach to develop the entire value chain, from seeding arts start-ups, nurturing and developing artists, arts groups and arts businesses, to internationalisation.

NAC organises major festivals, events and competitions to showcase local and international talents, as well as to identify new talents. Arts awards are given to artists in recognition of artistic excellence and to patrons for arts sponsorship.

To build new audiences and broaden arts

participation, NAC engages the wider community in the arts through outreach programmes and offers arts education programmes in schools.

The Council helps build capabilities of arts practitioners, professionals and arts business. It plays an active role in cultural exchanges and international platforms. It also plans for the long term use of arts infrastructure and carries out research and surveys to support advocacy programmes.

The Patron of the Council is President of Singapore, S R Nathan. The Council comprises 18 members from the private and public sectors. It is supported by a team of arts advisers and resource panel members who provide feedback and advice. A list of arts advisers and resource panel members is in Annex 1.



WORK OF ARTS

There has never been a better time for artistic talents in Singapore. In a year underlined by highly anticipated events such as the inaugural Singapore Biennale and the prestigious Singapore Arts Festival, Singapore's talents are enjoying more resources, support and recognition than ever before. In the performing arts, visual arts and literary arts sectors, this has been an excellent year for our artists. he success of the Singapore arts scene hinges on the quality and visibility of our arts capital – our artistic talents recognised for their good works at home and abroad. During the year, two key efforts stood out in positioning Singapore as a vibrant global city for the arts, raising the profile of our artists and attracting strong participation from the international arts community.

The first was the inaugural Singapore Biennale.

From 4 September to 12 November 2006, Singapore's first international biennale of contemporary art debuted to much buzz with works of 95 artists. 883,300 local and international visitors came to its 19 venues islandwide. The event was well publicised in over 1,000 favourable international and domestic press reviews and media reports. The list of participating artists is in Annex 4.

The Biennale was also a critical platform for exchange and dialogue between Singapore and the global arts community; more than half of our participating local artists were subsequently invited to showcase their works around the world.

The second was the annual Singapore Arts Festival. Held from 1 to 25 June, Singapore Arts Festival 2006 drew record crowds in excess of half a million people to 24 main productions and over 400 free performances, exhibitions and special events.

Its core programmes featured six world premieres, six Asian premieres and three co-commissions,

and some 1,758 artists from 26 countries and regions. 23 of 58 performances were sold-out with some 27,708 tickets snapped up. Outreach events also attracted a strong crowd of 494,977 people from the wider community.

New interdisciplinary and multicultural works were introduced including a rare fusion of contemporary dance and Chinese orchestral music, *Quest* (Singapore) and animation theatre productions, *SAMOVAR: Check Out Chekov* (Austria) and *The Great War* (The Netherlands).

This year's Festival also provided the launchpad for dance creation platform *Forward Moves* as well as *POPagenda Singapore*, the music platform inaugurated at the Festival.

Backed by a lively marketing and commu-

nications campaign, the exuberant Festival spirit filled the streets, airwaves and even the cyberspace, helping the public to engage with the works and artists in fresh new ways. The list of participating artists and arts groups is in Annex 5.

PERFORMING ARTS

In advancing the performing arts, the Council awarded \$4.6 million in grants to artists and arts organisations during the year. The two-year Major Grant Scheme disbursed \$2.2 million to six of Singapore's top performing arts companies – Singapore Dance Theatre, The Necessary Stage, TheatreWorks (S) Ltd, The Theatre Practice, Singapore Repertory Theatre and W!ld Rice. Annual Grants worth \$1.1 million were given to 13 arts groups.

Training grants were also offered in the year. The Rotary-NAC Arts Training Grant was awarded to 18 performing arts practitioners for workshops, seminars and short-term residencies in Singapore and overseas. The Professional Skills Development Fund supported four arts administrators and technical personnel in upgrading their skills in Singapore and abroad. The list of grant recipients is in Annexes 2 and 3.

TheatreWorks' *Diaspora* provided the multisensory arts feast of the year. It was commissioned as the opening cultural performance for delegates attending the Annual Meetings of the Board of Governors of the International Monetary Fund and World Bank Group. The sweeping panoramic docu-drama, directed by Ong Keng Sen, combined cultural and arts disciplines for a breathtaking showcase of the very best and brightest performing arts talents from Singapore and ASEAN.

The biennial National Chinese Music Competition attracted a record number of 265 entries, an increase of 8% compared to 2004. Also during the year, the 2006 National Indian Music Competition saw 121 budding musicians competing in eight categories including the sitar, veena, vocal and ensemble. The list of winners is in Annexes 6 and 7.

In nurturing talent in music, the Artistin-Residence Scheme funded the training of the Young People's Performing Arts Ensemble by renowned children's choir director, Yang Hong Nian.

The dance community now has a resource and communication platform with the setting up of a dedicated website at www.DanSing.org.sg. Developed by NAC in partnership with I Dance Central, the website serves as an online resource centre and network for the dance community and includes a calendar of events, a directory of dancerelated organisations and a forum.

In FY 2006 NAC supported 50 performing artists in music, theatre and dance as they ventured abroad to make their mark on the global stage.

The Victoria Chorale participated in the World Choir Games 2006 in Xiamen, China and garnered several gold medals and a category champion accolade for its critically-acclaimed performance. Two home-grown bands, Electrico and The Great

Sky Experiment also did Singapore proud when they were selected to perform at the internationally renowned South-by-Southwest Music Festival in Austin, USA.

The Singapore Dance Theatre completed a successful tour in Korea in October 2006. NAC supported the travel costs for this landmark tour that has led to more international invitations for this leading dance company.

LITERARY ARTS

Much progress was made during the year as the NAC dedicated its efforts to raising the profile and quality of literary arts in Singapore.

The General Grants Scheme disbursed \$148,096 to arts organisations, enabling them to develop quality programmes and hire full-time professionals. Individual writers, poets and playwrights were also accorded financial assistance to publish and disseminate new writing, and to attend festivals and conferences overseas to forge new connections with the global literary community. The National Book Development Council of Singapore, the only annual grant beneficiary, received \$55,000 in FY 2006. In addition to the organisation's annual operating and production expenses, part of the grant was utilised for the launch of the Singapore Writer's Centre – an online resource – and the publication of a *Writer's Resource Kit* for both new and established authors. The list of grant recipients is in Annexes 2 and 3.

In honing the craft of writing as it is for the other art forms, it is important to create avenues and opportunities for our artists to exchange ideas, knowledge and experiences with others in the field. To this end, NAC has initiated ties with the Western Michigan University and local educational and arts institutions to explore the possibility of starting a creative skills/residency programme with a Pan-Asian focus, to be based in Singapore. Discussions with the Arvon Foundation (UK) and University of British Columbia (Canada) regarding residency/creative training options have also taken place.

In July 2006, NAC was invited to attend the Prague Summer Programme organised by the Western Michigan University in cooperation with Charles University (Prague).

Moving forward, the Council has started working with a partner, The Arts House to plan for the biennials, Singapore Writers' Festival and Golden Point Award in 2007.

Funds were disbursed to help uplift the presence of Singaporean writers and literary arts groups in the region and beyond.

Poet and playwright Alfian Sa'at participated in the Ubud Writers and Readers Festival 2006, poet Cyril Wong presented his works at the Seoul Fringe Festival and local group Silnt promoted *Blyss Pack One* at the Tokyo International Book Fair. Publishing and project grants were given to writers, literary societies and publishers such as Ethos Books, Global Publishing Co Pte Ltd and Equatorial Wind Publishing to publish or present local works.

VISUAL ARTS

In FY 2006, the Council disbursed \$838,877 in general grants and \$60,395 in training grants to artists, arts organisations and collectives in visual and multi-disciplinary arts. Funding support was also provided to outstanding artists to participate

in long-term residencies at prestigious institutions including Rijksakademie Research Residency (Amsterdam) and the Nordic Institute for Contemporary Art (Finland). The list of grant recipients is in Annexes 2 and 3.

The Division also worked with key partners during the year to formulate new initiatives to develop the art form. Among these were the Artist-in-Residence programme and the establishment of a new studio space with National Youth Centre's *scape.

DEVELOPING THE LARGER CREATIVE CIRCLES

Whether it is the performing arts, literary arts or visual arts, there exists a larger circle of individuals who provide vital creative services to make world-class arts possible. From arts administration to event management, arts education and technicalities of theatre production, the Council recognises the need to develop the various capabilities within these creative industries.

FY 2006 saw a total of about \$1.4 million disbursed to 100 scholarship and bursary recipients. Among them were the 2006 Shell-NAC Arts Scholarship recipients, Duana Chan, Alison Carroll and Kuo Jing Hong, who are pursuing Literary Arts, Dance, and Directing and Actor Training for Theatre respectively. The list of recipients is in Annex 3.

The Council collaborated with the Ministry of Information, Communications and the Arts (MICA) and the Singapore Workforce Development Agency to create an integrated education and training programme for working adults in the creative industries. Named the Workforce Skills Qualification, the new framework will benefit employers, employees and training institutions in raising the standards of training, career and curriculum development, and professionalism in the industry. The Council also collaborated with the National Library Board to develop the National Online Repository of the Arts. It aims to document the development of the Singapore arts scene through the creation of digitised contents related to the lives and works of our Cultural Medallion recipients. When completed, the contents will be accessible to the public.

RECOGNISING OUTSTANDING ARTISTS

Raising the profile and prestige of Singapore's highest honour for the arts, the Cultural Medallion Award 2006 was presented for the first time by His Excellency President S R Nathan.

Honorees of the award were Lynnette Seah Mei Tsing, violinist and co-leader of the Singapore Symphony Orchestra, and visual artist Tan Choh Tee. To date, 88 artists have been conferred the Cultural Medallion.

The Cultural Medallion Grant was increased to a maximum of \$80,000 per recipient, \$30,000 more than the previous year.

In recognition for our next generation of artists, the Young Artist Award was presented to eight promising talents. They were Lim Yan (Music), Toh Ban Sheng (Music), Chong Tze Chien (Theatre), Beatrice Chia-Richmond (Theatre), Francis Ng (Visual Arts), Yeo Chee Kiong (Visual Arts), Kelvin Tong (Film) and Yo Shao Ann (Technical Theatre). To date, 86 artists have received the Award.

ARTFUL PARTNERSHIPS

The arts is no longer a fringe activity. In fact the arts is making more sense and drawing the dollars too. Successful symbiotic alliances have been formed between arts groups and the private sector, such as the Emily Hill Enterprise Ltd and the Jalan Bahar Clay Studios. Together with increased interest in arts sponsorships and the thriving industry of arts management and support businesses, the Council is moving forward to reinforce our arts infrastructure and create new opportunities for the arts and businesses to come together and thrive.

LINKING ARTS AND ENTERPRISE

he healthy state of the arts in Singapore has enabled the Council to play new roles in helping businesses and the arts community come together for a greater good. NAC liaised directly with the Singapore Land Authority (SLA) to assist the Emily Hill Enterprise Ltd in securing its premises at 11 Upper Wilkie Road and obtaining rental rates based on institutional rates. This project marked the first time the Council has facilitated between an arts group and the SLA to secure arts spaces.

During the year, the Council provided financial assistance to incentivise commercial galleries to boost sales and to cultivate new appreciation for the arts through its Partnership Funding for Arts Business grant. The beneficiaries included the 6th International Guitar Festival, WOMAD 2006, ARTSingapore 2006 and the Jalan Bahar Clay Studios (JBCS), home of Singapore's few remaining historical Dragon Kilns. The funding JBCS received will go towards helping the Studios preserve an important part of Singapore pottery heritage as it breathes new life into the arts community involved in clay arts.

The Ultimate Freeport was another exciting project that the Council embarked on together with the private sector and government agencies.

In the literary arts world, NAC has also established contact with literary agents. Acknowledging their pivotal role in helping writers get published and gain international recognition, the Council has invited these literary agents to set up office in Singapore and provide easy access to our local literary artists for representation overseas.

RISING SPONSORSHIP FOR THE ARTS

From individuals to corporations alike, there is mounting interest in arts sponsorship. In 2006, total arts sponsorship amounted to \$33.5 million. The Council received \$4.8 million in cash and \$4.5 million in kind for projects such as festivals, competitions, scholarships, bursaries and outreach programmes. The list of NAC sponsors is in Annex 8.

The prestigious Patron of the Arts Awards 2007 was presented to 265 individuals and

corporations in recognition of their contributions to the arts. There were 19 Distinguished Patrons, 14 Patrons, 44 Friends and 37 Associates of the Arts. The Arts Supporter Award was given to 151 individuals and organisations. The list of Award recipients is in Annex 9.

In our continuing effort to grow the sponsorship business and increase private and corporate support for the arts, the Council championed an initiative to develop and nurture professional sponsorship agencies for the arts industry. This new initiative saw several agencies expressing strong interest in developing their sponsorship solicitation services into full-fledged business units, offering professional and dedicated arts sponsorship management services.

SPRUCING UP ARTS INFRASTRUC-TURE

Creating and maintaining affordable quality spaces for arts creation and enjoyment is a key

priority for the NAC. In this regard, the Council reviews policies on the development of arts facilities and services, administers the Arts Housing Scheme and manages theatres.

67 arts organisations and 29 artists benefited from the Arts Housing Scheme in FY 2006. NAC subsidised 90% of the market rental amounting to \$3.7 million. The list of Arts Housing tenants is in Annex 10.

The Council also embarked on refurbishment exercises at the Stamford Arts Centre and the Telok Ayer Performing Arts Centre.

Victoria Theatre remained the theatre of choice

with 86% utility in 2006. The Theatre attained ISO9001:2000 re-certification during the year.

The opening of the new Drama Centre in November 2005 set the stage for the final curtain call at Kallang Theatre which closed in March 2007. With utilisation rates of 89%, the state-ofthe-art Drama Centre is fast becoming the most popular venue among local arts groups.

ENGAGING PARTNERS, PUBLIC AND MEDIA

In FY 2006, the Council hosted about 80 foreign print and broadcast journalists under its media familiarisation programme. The visits were scheduled during major events such as the Singapore Arts Festival and Singapore Biennale to enable the journalists to experience the vibrancy of the arts in Singapore. Regular press briefings and networking sessions were also held for the local media to cultivate relations and to enhance their understanding of the work of the Council.

In February 2007, the Council launched the new National Publicity Platform (NPP) to brand our very own Arts and Heritage District. Specially

designed buntings were displayed on 250 lampposts to create a vibrant and distinct identity for the district where many arts venues, arts groups, museums, heritage institutions and schools reside. The lamp-posts also provided free publicity channels for non-profit arts, heritage, cultural and other creative industries-related organisations to publicise their events throughout the year. The NPP is a multi-agency initiative involving the Ministry of Information, Communications and the Arts, the Media Development Authority, the National Heritage Board and the National Library Board.

One of the key strategies to further boost arts appreciation and engagement is the creation of a strong arts advocacy programme. The Council aims to increase information, research and knowledge about the arts and culture in Singapore and to facilitate a more robust people-private-public partnership in promoting arts and culture.

During the year, two major statistical surveys were conducted for the Singapore Arts Festival and the Singapore Biennale. The results will continue to offer insightful information for gauging audience

profile and responses to these major events.





PART OF OUR LIVES

From Fort Canning Green to Choa Chu Kang, it's been a big year for the arts in the community. No longer reserved for the upper echelons of society, the arts is now accessible to all walks of life. Through large scale programmes like the first District Arts Festival enjoyed by over 40,000 residents in the North West District, to the NAC-ExxonMobil concerts for families and a new arts mentorship programme for youths under Noise Singapore, the Council continues to make the arts an integral part of our lives.

he arts is for all to enjoy, and even more so this year. The Council's efforts to engage the wider community in the arts gained new momentum with the inking of two Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs).

Bringing together respective objectives of developing the arts and promoting community bonding, the Council and the People's Association aim to pool resources to increase community participation in the arts. An MOU was signed on 31 October 2006, providing the framework for both organisations to jointly develop distinctive district arts festivals with the Community Development Councils (CDCs), build artistic capabilities of community-based arts groups and facilitate the formation of arts interest groups. The inaugural North West Arts Festival organised by the North West CDC from 26 November to 31 December 2006 presented a wide range of arts and ethnic programmes to an impressive crowd of 40,000 people.

On 3 August 2006, the Council signed an MOU with the Republic Polytechnic to help develop the institution's cultural centre into a regional arts centre in the northern sector of Singapore. The agreement will facilitate a host of collaborations between the two parties including the sharing of technical arts expertise, the development of new arts audiences and joint research studies.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

In FY 2006, the Council organised and supported 158 free arts events, reaching an audience of some 143,200. Working with key stakeholders in the public and private sectors as well as grassroots organisations, the Council was able to bring quality arts programmes to different segments of the population.

The Stage Is Yours, a concert series aimed at providing budding talents with a public stage, was held in collaboration with the Central Singapore CDC, North West CDC and South East CDC. It attracted an interesting mix of 446 students, retirees and professionals to showcase their talents and was attended by over 11,000 people.

The Council continued to support the North West CDC's Cultural Focus Points, a programme that aims to raise the quality of schools and community-based groups. At the same time, NAC

provided seed money to various grassroots organisations and arts groups for their community and neighbourhood arts events.

WORKING WITH CORPORATE PARTNERS

The Council renewed its major corporate partnerships with ExxonMobil, Shell and Raffles City to bring popular events to the community.

One of the longest running outdoor arts series, the *NAC-ExxonMobil Concert in the Park* celebrated its 10th birthday on 30 July 2006. Offering a diverse range of performing arts programmes for a predominantly family-based audience, the event drew more than 7,000 people to its anniversary bash held at the Singapore Botanic Gardens. Bringing the arts to the doorsteps of residents in areas like Choa Chu Kang, Toa Payoh, Marine Parade, Pasir Ris and Woodlands was the NAC-Shell Community Arts Series. More than 4,000 heartlanders attended the series of concerts which featured various genres and fusions of dance, music, theatre as well as ethnic art forms.

The Council also continued endorsement of the Raffles City's *Arts in the City* programmes, keeping 41,000 working executives happy during the lunch hours with exhibitions and concerts featuring local and foreign acts.

WORKING WITH GOVERNMENT AGENCIES

Always open to new ways of bringing the arts to the people, the Council endorsed and supported arts programmes organised by other government agencies. These included the National Parks Board's arts programmes which enlivened the parkscape and the Asian Children's Festival organised by the National Library Board to celebrate the joys of childhood through experiential learning. Programme highlights included the Asian Children's Expo, the Asian Children's Writers and the Asian Illustrators' Conference. NAC also worked with the Singapore General Hospital and Central Narcotics Bureau to promote arts for physical, emotional and social wellbeing.

ARTS EDUCATION

The Council collaborates with the education sector to develop interest in the arts in children from an early age.

During the year, schools booked 2,500 NACendorsed arts education programmes which benefited more than 330,000 students. The programmes of theatre, dance, music, multimedia and visual arts were conducted by professional artists and arts educators, and included interactive programmes, workshops, performances and exhibitions held at public arts venues.

Under the Artist-in-School Scheme, students from 11 schools had the opportunity to interact

with professional artists to deepen their appreciation and experiences in the creative process. Key collaborations included a drama infusion programme at the Tanjong Katong Secondary School, a dance programme that integrated dance in the school curriculum at Shuqun Primary School and a ceramic art appreciation programme in Yio Chu Kang Primary School.

MORE SCHOOLS BAG AWARDS

The annual National Arts Education Award recognises schools, junior colleges and centralised institutes that integrate the arts

into their curriculum. The 2006 Award attracted participation from 45 secondary schools. 14 schools, twice the number in 2004, were conferred the top awards signifying the increasing emphasis on arts in the school curriculum.

Dunman High School received the Gold Award from Dr Lee Boon Yang, Minister for Information, Communications and the Arts at the award ceremony on 24 August 2006. Crescent Girls', Raffles Girls', Chung Cheng High (Main), Ang Mo Kio and Tanjong Katong Girls' Secondary Schools won the Silver Award. The Bronze Award winners were Paya Lebar Methodist Girls', Nan Chiau High, CHIJ Katong Convent, Raffles Institution, Nan Hua High, Anglo-Chinese (Independent), Yio Chu Kang and Deyi Secondary Schools. The award for primary schools alternates with secondary schools and will be held in 2007.

NOISE SINGAPORE PUMPS UP THE VOLUME

Into its second year, Noise Singapore, the first media-based arts festival for youths aged 25 years and below, turned up the volume in terms of activities, programmes and participation.

Noise Singapore 2006 debuted two new programmes. The Apprentice Programme provided opportunities for 26 young people to work alongside 17 prominent professionals, giving these youths a headstart in the creative industries. The Festival Showcase presented 1,300 selected works in a public exhibition held at the Marina Square Central Atrium from 9 to 12 November 2006 and across various media channels over a period of one month.

A total of 1,851 youths participated in the event, up 57% from the previous year. A total of 4,800 works were submitted in the categories of Art & Design, Photography and Music, as well as sponsored categories. The event which aims to encourage youths to create original works and promote greater appreciation of artistic creativity also reached a bigger pool of audience – some three million people to be exact. Works were also of notably higher standards.





A FLYING START

With the many successes at home, NAC is now taking leadership positions in international networks such as the International Federation of Arts Councils and Cultural Agencies and the Association of Asian Performing Arts Festivals. Our increasing presence on the world stage through commissioned works, awards for artists and events such as our national showcase, Singapore Season, bode well for Singapore as we work towards global arts city status.



AC adopts a multi-pronged approach in promoting Singapore's artistic talents and raising its profile as an international arts city overseas.

CULTURAL EXCHANGES

Cultural MOUs signed with our international counterparts enable Singapore artists and arts groups to showcase their works overseas and to host foreign talents on home ground.

The NAC and Arts Council England MOU paved the way for a residency and exchange programme with the Institute of Contemporary Art Singapore and the International Photography Research Network in UK. Singapore photographer Chua Chye Teck and UK-based French photographer Magali Pettier were selected to participate in the programme.

Under the Singapore-India Executive Programme, Lalit Kala Akademi presented a contemporary Indian arts exhibition held in conjunction with the Singapore Arts Festival 2006.

The renewal of the Singapore-China Executive Programme in FY 2006 facilitated several exchange

programmes. The Jin Xing Dance Company performed at the Singapore Arts Festival 2006 and five prominent Chinese musicians and professors, namely Hu Zhi Hou, Liu Chang Fu, Liu Han Li, Wang Qiao Wei, and Wu Yu Xia adjudicated at the National Chinese Music Competition in December 2006. Three artists and two curators from China participated in the Singapore Biennale 2006 and works by the late Singaporean artist Lim Joo Hong were featured in the Shanghai Biennale in September 2006.

In the cultural exchange programme with Korea, visual artist Suzann Victor was featured in the Gwangju Biennale 2006 while three Korean artists and two curators participated in the Singapore Biennale 2006. The gala performance of Singapore Arts Festival 2006, *Quest* featured a contemporary piece by Korean choreographer, Kim Eun Hee. NAC regularly participates in programmes under the cultural network of ASEAN. Ten representatives from Singapore took take part in the ASEAN-China Joint Cultural Performance and Symphony Orchestra of Young Musicians at the Angkor Wat in Cambodia in April 2006. Participants were also sent to the 2nd ASEAN-Republic of Korea Arts Management Workshop in May 2006. Two dancers and a five-person a capella group represented Singapore at the ASEAN-China Commemorative Summit gala show in Nanjing on 30 October 2006.

NAC collaborated with the Thai Embassy to facilitate the presentation of the Bangkok Symphony Orchestra in Singapore in commemoration of the 60th anniversary of H.M. King Bhumibol Adulyadej at the throne. The performance was held on 8 October 2006.

2007. It will be presented in partnership with some of China's most prestigious festivals, and leading cultural and educational institutions. The *Singapore Season* in China seeks to present the new face of Singapore – a creative city, a global meeting place for ideas, creativity and innovation. It aims to engage and excite China audiences and foster closer ties between the two countries.

LEADERSHIP ROLES

Further reinforcing our leadership position in the international arts networks, NAC Chief Executive Officer, Lee Suan Hiang was appointed Deputy Chairman of the International Federation of Arts Councils and Cultural Agencies (IFACCA) for a 2-year tenure starting March 2007. Lee has been the Chairman of the IFACCA Asian Chapter since 2005. Singapore currently serves as the Asian Chapter's secretariat.

In June 2006, Director of the Singapore Arts Festival, Ms Goh Ching Lee was re-elected to chair the Executive Council of the Association of Asian Performing Arts Festivals for a second term.

In March 2007, Singapore played host to 17 overseas delegates and observers for the IFACCA Researchers' Summit, which focused on statistical indicators for arts policy and models for research in national arts agencies.

The Convene-in-Singapore Scheme aims to attract high-profile and high-yield arts and cultural conferences and events to Singapore. Since inception, the Scheme has supported the establishment of seven local chapters of international organisations and societies and won bids to host 11 conferences and meetings in Singapore. With increased marketing efforts during the year, Singapore can look forward to upcoming events such as the International Symposium on Electronic Art in 2008, Asia Pacific Harmonica Festival in 2010 and the International Trombone Festival in 2010.

ARTS MARKETS & FAIRS

Guided by our goal to promote Singapore artists and arts groups overseas as well as to facilitate market access and content export, the Council participated in several international arts markets, literary festivals and book fairs.

In November 2006, NAC marketed Singapore performing artists and arts companies to over 1,000 delegates at CINARS, one of the world's largest performing arts markets.

NAC supported the Singapore Pavilion at MIDEM, the world's largest music trade fair in Cannes, France. Spearheaded by the Composers and Authors Society of Singapore Ltd, the delegation comprised representatives from 10 Singapore music companies. The pavilion was also supported by the Media Development Authority and International Enterprise Singapore.

With the view to develop the literary arts scene and to incentivise international literary agents to set up shop in Singapore, NAC attended the Frankfurt Book Fair to promote Singapore writers, literary publishers and products to the world market. Trips were also made to the Edinburgh International Book Festival, the Ubud Writers and Readers Festival and the Vancouver International Writers Festival. These visits provided opportunities for the Council to meet and develop relationships with top industry and artistic personalities around the world, secure overseas attendees for the Singapore Writers Festival 2007 and profile Singapore authors in overseas festivals.





HEART WORK

The journey of transforming Singapore into a global city for the arts begins here, at the heart of NAC – our people. With People Developer Standard already in place and the attainment of Singapore Quality Class status close at hand, NAC's aim for organisational excellence is underpinned by the good state of our heart. By taking time to recognise and uphold good work, and facilitating a progressive work culture and environment, NAC is on track to being a worldclass arts organisation that is deeply committed to its people.

o enable Singapore to achieve world-class status as a city for the arts, NAC must first be a worldclass arts organisation. And our journey has begun towards achieving Organisation Excellence (OE). A first and important step taken in the year has been the setting up of the Organisation Development Section, a team dedicated to ensuring our smooth passage to OE. With ISO 9001:2000 (theatres) and the People Developer Standard already in place,

the Council is setting its sights on attaining Singapore Quality Class status by mid 2007. At that milestone, NAC will be among a pool of world-class organisations which will be the key drivers in enhancing Singapore's competitiveness.

Underpinning the OE framework at NAC are

the on-going PS21 innovation initiatives with the Staff Suggestion Scheme (SSS) and New Improvement Circle @ NAC (NicNAC) being the two key drivers.

Both SSS and NicNAC have garnered 100% staff participation with more than 700 suggestions received via the online suggestion management system and the fortnightly Thinkathon sessions. A total of 14 projects to improve work processes have been completed as a result of these initiatives.

KEEPING STAFF RELEVANT

The training focus for the year was on organisational excellence. The Council invested \$0.5 million in staff training and development, which represents 4.5% of total payroll. The average number of training day per staff was 8.4 days. In addition to a Service Quality Class

workshop, staff were offered a wide range of training and upgrading programmes to enhance their skills, knowledge and capabilities. Among these were programmes on arts policies, events management, music appreciation, procurement and technical training for theatre staff as well as overseas working and training trips.

In addition to professional and career enhancement opportunities, the Council puts the welfare of its staff in high priority. The Council took up two new group insurance schemes for personal accident and term life insurance for all staff. The Flexi-Benefits scheme also saw an improvement in the quantum and range of benefits covered.

To encourage open channels of communications between staff and management, the Staff Communication Session was introduced this year. The new Council-wide dialogue session held twice a year will also provide staff with a platform to raise their concerns to the management.

In our quest for OE, the Council is also preparing to implement business continuity plans. Scheduled to be ready in 2007, the plans will add to the resilience of the Council to minimise the impact of unforeseen business disruptions

and safeguard the interests of key stakeholders, customers and staff.

For the second year, the Council was awarded the Singapore Health Award (Gold) by the Health Promotion Board in recognition of its commitment to promote workplace health programmes. Some programmes organised included health screenings, weekly jogging and ball-sport sessions, bowling excursions, stress management workshops and Latin dance classes.

RECOGNISING STELLAR PERFORMANCE

During the year, 11 staff stood out at organisational and national levels for their good work.

Two officers were conferred National Day Awards in recognition for their dedicated service. Elaine Ng, Director of Performing Arts Development received the Public Administration Medal (Bronze) and Chua Sock Hwang, Assistant Director of Arts Education was awarded the Efficiency Medal.

Cindy Tan from the Infrastructure Development Unit won the National Level Star Service

EMPOWERING WORK Performance Through IT

Being constantly up to speed and responsive to news and changes in the industry and work environment is important for staff to perform effectively. NAC devoted much time and attention to capitalising on Information Technology (IT) for the benefit of staff.

In November 2006, the Council launched its Intranet, providing a centralised gateway for staff to access and share information easily within the organisation. IntraNAC will become a comprehensive knowledge repository that will also enhance the work efficiency and responsiveness of staff at all levels.

An online web-based system was introduced at the Drama Centre in September 2006 to enhance the quality of usher service and to improve work efficiencies in administering and managing ushers. The system enables ushers, usually part-time or highly mobile, to access and book duty slots any time and from anywhere with Internet access. It also enhances the efficiency of usher administration as it automates total work hours and salaries tabulations.

The IT infrastructure and computer facilities for the Victoria Theatre have been upgraded with direct broadband connectivity to the Council's main office at MICA building. With this upgrade, all the remote offices together with the main office are now integrated into one work environment.

APRIL 2006

NAC sent 10 representatives from Singapore to participate in the ASEAN-China Joint Cultural Performance and Symphony Orchestra of Young Musicians at the Angkor Wat in Cambodia from 5 to 10 April.

MAY 2006

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JULY 2006

AUGUST 2006

- The North West Arts Festival, under the NAC-PA MOU, was successfully held from 26 November to 31 December. Some 40,000 residents enjoyed the spectacular opening event and a wide range of arts and ethnic programmes.
- Held from 5 to 16 December, the biennial 2006 National Chinese Music Competition attracted a record 265 entries. New initiatives included a new category for Suona and the opportunity for competitors in all solo instrument sections to perform concerto pieces.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE NATIONAL ARTS COUNCIL

We have audited the financial statements of the National Arts Council (the "Council") which comprise the balance sheet of the Council as at 31 March 2007, the income and expenditure statement, statement of changes in capital and reserves and cash flow statement of the Council for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes, as set out on pages 39 to 48.

RESPONSIBILITY OF THE MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL

The members of the Council are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the provisions of the National Arts Council Act (Cap. 193A) (the "Act") and Singapore Financial Reporting Standards. This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

AUDITORS' RESPONSIBILITY

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Singapore Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance on whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Council's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the members of the Council, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

BASIS FOR QUALIFIED OPINION

Under the Ministry of Finance Circular FCM No. M4/2005 dated 11 February 2005, the Council need not disclose related party transactions and balances with other state-controlled entities as required by Singapore Financial Reporting Standards 24 – Related Party Disclosures ("FRS 24"). Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements do not disclose the information on related party disclosures with other state-controlled entities.

QUALIFIED OPINION

In our opinion, except for the matters noted in the preceding paragraph,

- a) the financial statements of the Council are properly drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the Act and Singapore Financial Reporting Standards so as to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Council as at 31 March 2007, and of the results, changes in capital and reserves and cash flows of the Council for the financial year ended on that date; and
- b) the accounting and other records required by the Act to be kept by the Council have been properly kept in accordance with the provisions of the Act.

REPORT ON OTHER LEGAL AND REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS

During the course of our audit, nothing came to our notice that caused us to believe that the receipt, expenditure and investment of monies and the acquisition and disposal of assets by the Council during the financial year have not been in accordance with the provisions of the Act.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS 31 March 2007

1 GENERAL

The registered office and principal place of business of the National Arts Council (the "Council") is at 140 Hill Street, #03-01, MICA Building, Singapore 179369. The financial statements are expressed in Singapore dollars.

During the current year, the Council issued 5,030 (2005/2006 : 203,776) shares of \$1 each to the Minister for Finance, a body corporate incorporated under the Minister for Finance (Incorporation) Act (Cap. 183), under the debt-equity framework.

The principal activities of the Council are:

- a) to promote the appreciation, understanding and enjoyment of the arts;
- b) to support and assist in the establishment and development of arts organisations;
- c) to organise and promote artistic activities; and
 d) to establish and maintain arts theatres and other arts facilities.

The financial statements of the Council for the year ended 31 March 2007 were authorised for issue by the members of the Council on 30 August 2007.

2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention, except as disclosed in the accounting policies below, and are drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the National Arts Council Act (Cap. 193A) and Singapore Financial Reporting Standards ("FRS"), except for non-disclosure of related party transactions and balances with other state-controlled entities as required by FRS 24 – Related Party Disclosures (see paragraph below).

Under the Finance Circular Minute issued by Ministry of Finance No. M4/2005, the Council need not disclose related party transactions and balances with other state-controlled entities as required by FRS 24 – Related Party Disclosures. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements do not disclose fully the information on related party disclosures with other state-controlled entities.

In the current financial year, the Council has adopted all the new and revised FRSs and Interpretations of FRS ("INT FRS") issued by the Council on Corporate Disclosure and Governance that are relevant to its operations and effective for annual periods beginning on or after 1 April 2006. The adoption of these new/revised FRSs and INT FRSs does not result in changes to the Council's accounting policies and has no material effect on the amounts reported for the current or prior years.

The application of FRS 107 – Financial Instruments: Disclosure and the consequential amendments to other FRS will not affect any of the amounts recognised in the financial statements commencing from 1 April 2007, but will change the disclosures presently made in relation to the Council's financial instruments and the objectives, policies and processes for managing capital.

At the date of authorisation of these financial statements, management has considered the various FRSs, INT FRSs which were issued but not yet effective. Other than FRS 107, management anticipates that the adoption of the FRS and INT FRS in future periods will have no material impact on the financial statements of the Council in the period of their initial adoption.

b) FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised on the Council's balance sheet when the Council becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

FINANCIAL ASSETS

Investments are recognised and de-recognised on a trade date where the purchase or sale of an investment is under a contract whose terms require delivery of the investment within the timeframe established by the market concerned, and are initially measured at fair value, net of transaction costs except for those financial assets classified as at fair value through income and expenditure which are initially measured at fair value.

Other financial assets are classified into the following specified categories: financial assets "at fair value through income and expenditure", "held-tomaturity investments", "available-for-sale" financial assets and "loans and receivables". The classification depends on the nature and purpose of the financial assets and is determined at the time of initial recognition.

EFFECTIVE INTEREST METHOD

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial instrument and of allocating interest income or expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts or payments through the expected life of the financial instrument, or where appropriate, a shorter period. Income or expense is recognised on an effective interest rate basis for debt instruments other than those financial instruments "at fair value through income and expenditure".

2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont² d)

b) FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS (cont'd)

<u>FINANCIAL ASSETS AT FAIR VALUE THROUGH INCOME AND EXPENDITURE (FVTIE)</u> Financial assets are classified as at FVTIE where the financial asset is either held for trading or it is designated as at FVTIE.

A financial asset other than a financial asset held for trading may be designated as at FVTIE upon initial recognition if:

- such designation eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency that would otherwise arise; or
- the financial asset forms part of a group of financial assets or financial liabilities or both, which is managed and its performance is evaluated on a fair value basis, in accordance with the Council's documented risk management or investment strategy, and information about the grouping is provided internally on that basis; or
- it forms part of a contract containing one or more embedded derivatives, and FRS 39 permits the entire combined contract (asset or liability) to be designated as at FVTIE.

Financial assets at FVTIE are stated at fair value, with any resultant gain or loss recognised in the income and expenditure statement. The net gain or loss recognised in income or expenditure statement incorporates any dividend or interest earned on the financial asset. Fair value is determined in the manner described in Note 4(e).

AVAILABLE-FOR-SALE FINANCIAL ASSETS

Certain equity shares held by the Council are classified as available-for-sale and are stated at cost less impairment given that there is no reliable measure of their fair value. Dividends on available-for-sale equity instruments are recognised in the income and expenditure statement when the Council's right to receive payments is established.

LOANS AND RECEIVABLES

Loans and other receivables that have fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market are classified as "loans and receivables". Loans and receivables are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method less impairment. Interest is recognised by applying the effective interest rate method, except for short-term receivables when the recognition of interest would be immaterial.

IMPAIRMENT OF FINANCIAL ASSETS

Financial assets, other than those at fair value through income and expenditure, are assessed for indicators of impairment at each balance sheet date. Financial assets are impaired where there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the financial asset, the estimated future cash flows of the investment have been impacted. For financial assets carried at amortised cost, the amount of the impairment is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the original effective interest rate.

The carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced by the impairment loss directly for all financial assets with the exception of other receivables where the carrying amount is reduced through the use of an allowance account. When other receivable is uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited to the income and expenditure statement. Changes in the carrying amount of the allowance account are recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

With the exception of available-for-sale equity instruments, if, in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed through the income and expenditure statement to the extent the carrying amount of the investment at the date the impairment is reversed does not exceed what the amortised cost would have been had the impairment not been recognised.

In respect of available-for-sale equity instruments measured at cost less impairment, impairment loss once recognised cannot be reversed.

FINANCIAL LIABILITIES AND EQUITY INSTRUMENTS

CLASSIFICATION AS DEBT OR EQUITY

Financial liabilities and equity instruments issued by the Council are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

EQUITY INSTRUMENTS

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the Council after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments are recorded at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

OTHER FINANCIAL LIABILITIES

The Council's financial liabilities consist of other payables which are initially measured at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are subsequently measured at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method, with interest expense recognised on an effective yield basis.

2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont'd)

c) LEASES

Leases are classified as finance leases whenever the terms of the lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

THE COUNCIL AS LESSOR

Rental income from operating leases is recognised on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease unless another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which use benefit derived from the leased asset is diminished. Initial direct costs incurred in negotiating and arranging an operating lease are added to the carrying amount of the leased asset and recognised on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

THE COUNCIL AS LESSEE

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to income or expenditure statement on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease unless another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased asset are consumed. Contingent rentals arising under operating leases are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

In the event that lease incentives are received to enter into operating leases, such incentives are recognised as a liability. The aggregate benefit of incentives is recognised as a reduction of rental expense on a straight-line basis, except where another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased asset are consumed.

d) Property, Plant And Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation is charged so as to write off the cost of assets over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method, on the following bases:

Depreciation is not provided on works of art and works-in-progress.

Fixed assets costing less than \$2,000 each are charged to the income and expenditure statement in the year of purchase.

For assets purchased during the year, a full year's depreciation is provided except for leasehold land for which depreciation is provided on a monthly basis over the lease period. No depreciation is charged for assets disposed of during the year.

Assets belonging to the former National Theatre Trust, Singapore Cultural Foundation and the Arts Division of the Ministry of Information, Communications and the Arts ("MICA") were transferred to the Council at net book value when it was established and are depreciated over the remaining estimated useful lives of the assets.

The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at each year end, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for on a prospective basis.

Fully depreciated assets still in use are retained in the financial statements.

The gain or loss arising on disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amounts of the asset and is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

e) IMPAIRMENT OF ASSETS

At each balance sheet date, the Council reviews the carrying amount of its assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset.

If the recoverable amount of an asset is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in the income and expenditure statement.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in the income and expenditure statement.

2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont² d)

f) Prepaid Expenditure

Expenditure incurred for future events are recognised as prepayments and will be recognised as expenditure in the financial year in which events take place to match the related income.

g) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Council has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, and it is probable that the Council will be required to settle that obligation and a reasonable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the balance sheet date, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. Where a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows.

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, the receivable is recognised as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

h) GOVERNMENT GRANTS

Government grants for the establishment of the Council are taken to the Capital Account.

Government grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the Council will comply with the conditions attaching to them and the grants will be received. Government grants whose primary condition is that the Council should purchase, construct or otherwise acquire non-current assets are recognised as deferred capital grants in the balance sheet and transferred to income and expenditure statement on a systematic and rational basis over the useful lives of the related assets.

Other government grants are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match them with the costs for which they are intended to compensate, on a systematic basis. Government grants that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the Council with no future related costs are recognised in income and expenditure statement in the period in which they become receivable.

i) TRUST FUNDS

Trust funds are set up to account for monies held in trust for external parties. Income and expenditure of these funds are taken directly to the funds and the net assets relating to these funds are shown separately in the balance sheet.

Trust funds are accounted for on an accrual basis.

j) SINGAPORE ARTS ENDOWMENT FUND

The Singapore Arts Endowment Fund was established under Section 13 of the National Arts Council Act. The Fund comprises all monies transferred to the National Arts Council upon its formation, donations and gifts accepted by the Council for the Fund, such contributions to the Fund as the Minister for Information, Communications and the Arts may specify from monies provided by Parliament and such other monies as the Council may decide to transfer to the Fund.

Income from investment of the Fund is applied towards the development and promotion of arts in Singapore and accounted for in the income and expenditure statement of the Council.

The assets of the Fund are pooled with the assets of the Council in the balance sheet.

k) Support For The Arts Fund

The Support for the Arts Fund was established on 1 July 2003 for the development and promotion of arts in Singapore. Monies received by the Fund are channeled to arts programmes, projects and sub-funds as indicated by the donor.

The Support for the Arts Fund has been designated as an institution of a public character under Section 37(2) of the Income Tax Act on 1 August 2003 for a period of 5 years.

The net asset of the Support for the Arts Fund is shown as a separate line in the balance sheet.

Upon dissolution of the Support for the Arts Fund or when the Council ceases to exist, the remaining monies in the Fund shall be donated to charitable organisations which have been designated as institutions of a public character under Section 37(2) of the Income Tax Act and registered under the Charities Act Cap. 37, as decided by the Executive Committee administering the Fund.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS 31 March 2007 (cont'd)

2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont'd)

1) INCOME RECOGNITION

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

- i) Income derived from sale of tickets, advertisements and rental of theatres and other facilities is recognised when services have been rendered.
- Contributions and donations received for events held in the financial year under review are recognised as income when received.
- iii) Contributions and donations received for future events are recognised as income in the financial year in which the events take place to match the related expenditure.
- iv) Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to that asset's net carrying amount.
- v) Dividend income from investments is recognised when the right to receive payment has been established.
- m) Retirement Benefit Costs

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans are charged as an expense as they fall due. Payments made to state-managed retirement benefit schemes, such as the Singapore Central Provident Fund, are dealt with as payments to defined contribution plans where the Council's obligations under the plans are equivalent to those arising in a defined contribution retirement benefit plan.

Defined benefit retirement obligation due to a pensionable officer is recognised in the balance sheet in accordance with the Pensions Act (Cap. 225, 2005 Revised Edition). The pension amount payable is based on the last drawn salary of the respective officer and the officer's cumulative service period served with the Council at the time of retirement. The Council does not need to bear any medical liabilities for the pensionable officer upon retirement. The provision for pension due to the pensionable officer is determined based on the expected payments to be made by the Council in respect of services provided by the pensionable officer up to the balance sheet date.

- n) EMPLOYEE LEAVE ENTITLEMENT
 Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for annual leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the balance sheet date.
- CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS
 Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and demand deposits that
 are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an
 insignificant risk of changes in value.
- 3 CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

<u>CRITICAL JUDGMENTS IN APPLYING THE COUNCIL'S ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u> In the application of the Council's accounting policies, which are described in note 2, management is required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

In the current financial year, management has not made any critical judgements that have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

The key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the balance sheet date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are discussed below:

IMPAIRMENT OF PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

Where there are indications of impairment of its assets, the Council estimates the carrying amount of these assets to determine the extent of the impairment loss, if any. The recoverable amounts of these assets are determined based on the higher of fair value less cost to sell and value in use.

CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY (cont'd)

IMPAIRMENT OF PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT (cont'd)

Value in use calculations requires the Council to estimate the future cash flows expected to arise from the usage of its assets and a suitable discount rate in order to calculate present value. Based on management's value in use calculations, no provision for impairment loss is required. The provision for impairment made in the prior year was also reversed as the assets were disposed during the year. The gain from the disposal of the assets has been recognised in the current financial year (Note 13). The carrying amount of property, plant and equipment is disclosed in Note 13 to the financial statements.

USEFUL LIVES OF PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT

As described in Note 2, the Council reviews the estimated useful lives of property, plant and equipment at the end of each annual reporting period. Based on management's assessment as at the year end, there is no change in the useful lives of property, plant and equipment.

4 FINANCIAL RISKS AND MANAGEMENT

a) Credit Risk

3

The Council has no significant concentration of credit risk. Management regularly monitors the recoverability of investments and believes that it has been adequately provided for any exposure to potential losses.

Surplus cash and cash equivalents are placed with reputable financial institutions.

The maximum credit risk that the Council is exposed to is represented by the carrying amounts of its financial assets as stated in the balance sheet.

b) INTEREST RATE RISK

The Council's income and operating cash flows are substantially independent of changes in market interest rates. The Council's interest-bearing assets consist mainly of fixed income securities. The Council does not have any interest-bearing financial liabilities.

c) FOREIGN CURRENCY EXCHANGE RISK

The Council does not have any significant exposure to foreign currency exchange risk as most of its transactions are denominated in Singapore dollars.

d) LIQUIDITY RISK

The Council has minimal exposure to liquidity risk as its operations are funded by government grants. The Council has ensured sufficient liquidity through the holding of highly liquid assets in the form of cash and cash equivalents at all times to meet its financial obligations.

e) FAIR VALUES OF FINANCIAL ASSETS AND LIABILITIES

The carrying amounts of financial assets and liabilities reported in the balance sheet approximate their respective fair values due to the relatively short-term maturity of these financial instruments. The fair values of other classes of financial assets and liabilities are disclosed in the respective notes to financial statements.

The fair value of financial assets and financial liabilities with standard terms and conditions and traded in liquid markets are determined with reference to quoted market prices.

5 CAPITAL ACCOUNT

The Capital Account comprises reserves and certain assets of the former National Theatre Trust, Singapore Cultural Foundation and the Arts Division of the Ministry of Information, Communications and the Arts ("MICA") which were transferred to the National Arts Council for its establishment.

GIFTED YOUNG MUSICIANS BURSARY SCHEME

This scheme was set up by Rotary Club of Singapore East with the support of Braddell Heights Community Centre to provide financial assistance to gifted young musicians (below the age of 18) to pursue music studies overseas.

Lee Huei Min Trust Fund

The HSBC's Youth Excellence Initiative was set up with the objective to provide funding support towards young Singaporean talents to develop and realise their potential to the fullest, and achieve international recognition for themselves, and more importantly, for Singapore. Lee Huei Min became the first young talent to benefit from HSBC's \$250,000 donation. NAC administers the funds on behalf of HSBC.

ROTARY-NAC TRAINING GRANT

The fund provides financial assistance to practising artists who wish to pursue short-term training courses in fine arts, photography, music, dance, theatre and literature either locally or overseas. The grant quantum is up to 50% of total cost of training.

SHELL-NAC ARTS SCHOLARSHIP

This scholarship is awarded to outstanding practising artists and students to pursue overseas undergraduate and post-graduate studies in visual, performing and literary arts.

Singapore Dance Theatre Endowment Fund

This fund helps to meet the operating costs of the Singapore Dance Theatre Ltd.

TALENT DEVELOPMENT FUND

This fund was established to raise funds from private individuals and corporations, to assist outstanding young talents with potential to pursue a professional career in the arts. The fund is used to provide the identified beneficiaries with assistance for specialised professional training, participation in major international competitions and arts events and for other forms of assistance to facilitate their artistic development.

VIOLIN LOAN SCHEME

Launched in 2000, this Scheme aims to support Singapore violinists who have the potential and commitment to pursue an international career as a soloist. The Scheme currently owns a J B Guadagnini violin which is on loan to Miss Siow Lee Chin till 31 December 2008.

12 AVAILABLE-FOR-SALE INVESTMENT

This represents a 5% equity interest in Singapore Freeport Pte Ltd, a company incorporated in Singapore, which is set up to promote a free trade zone for the arts. As the fair value of the investment cannot be reliably estimated, the investment is stated at cost less accumulated impairment losses, if any.

1) In order to establish Singapore as a global city for the arts and to provide cultural ballast in the nation-building efforts, the Government bad, in the financial year 2000/2001, announced a \$50 million additional funding under the Renaissance City Project 1 ("RCP 1"). This is over and above the existing arts funding from the Government and is to be utilised over five years from financial year 2000/2001. The recommendations stated in the RCP 1 were implemented by MICA and its agencies.

To build on the foundations laid by RCP 1 to grow our arts industry capabilities, develop new arts business partners, the arts eco system and a more robust arts economy, RCP 2 was introduced in financial year 2005/2006 with a funding of \$24 million. The RCP 2 funding is to be utilised over 2 years from financial year 2005/2006. Both National Arts Council and National Heritage Board will implement the recommendations stated in RCP 2.

Transfer to Deferred Capital Grants from operating grants relates to purchase of plant and equipment out of the operating grants.

The balance of \$1,502,368 (2005/2006 : \$3,497,042) in operating grants as at 31 March 2007 relates to amounts earmarked for expenditures in the subsequent financial year.

The balance of \$197,982 (2005/2006 : \$1,000,000) in RCP grants as at 31 March 2007 relates to amounts earmarked for expenditures in the subsequent financial year.

The balance of \$1,689,729 (2005/2006 : \$2,847,756) in development grants as at 31 March 2007 comprise of provisions for works-in-progress.
