Venue Accessibility

Esplanade – Theatres on the Bay

Wheelchair Loan Service –

Wheelchairs are available upon request at no cost on the premises. Please contact the Customer Experience team at 6828 8377 if you require the use of a wheelchair.

Accessible Parking –

There are designated parking lots for patrons with mobility challenges. These are located at both levels of the basement carpark, close to the entrances to the centre.

Lift Access –

All lifts at Esplanade which are accessible to the public are wheelchair-friendly.

Accessible Toilets –

These toilets can accommodate wheelchairs and are conveniently located around the centre. Automatic doors are installed at these toilets for ease of use.

Hand Rails –

To provide support for elderly patrons, or patrons with mobility challenges, when walking up or down the staircases along both sides of the Concourse.

Tactile Floor Markings –

Textured ground surfaces offer directional aid for patrons who are blind or have low vision. They are installed at the carpark, drop-off points and Forecourt Garden.

Backrests –

Backrests have been installed along the last row of seats at the Outdoor Theatre, designed for the comfort of all patrons, especially the elderly.

Singapore Chinese Cultural Centre

Accessible Parking –

There are designated parking lots on every level of the carpark for patrons with mobility difficulties. They are located next to the lift lobby.

Lift Access –

All lifts are wheelchair-accessible. Lift announcements, and braille and tactile markings have been installed to assist the visually impaired when using the lifts.

As part of safe management measures, the lifts in the carpark lobbies have been temporarily shut down. If you need help to get around the centre after parking, please call 6812 7229 for assistance.

Wheelchair Loan Service –

Wheelchairs are available for loan at no charge for use within the premises.

Accessible Toilets –

Accessible toilets are conveniently located on every level of the Centre, except Level 2.

Special Seating Arrangements –

Accessible seats are available for patrons with mobility difficulties at the performance venues.

Braille Handrails –

Handrails at the premises are installed with braille information to guide the visually impaired.

Rest Areas –

Benches and seats are placed around the premises in quiet areas for patrons' use.

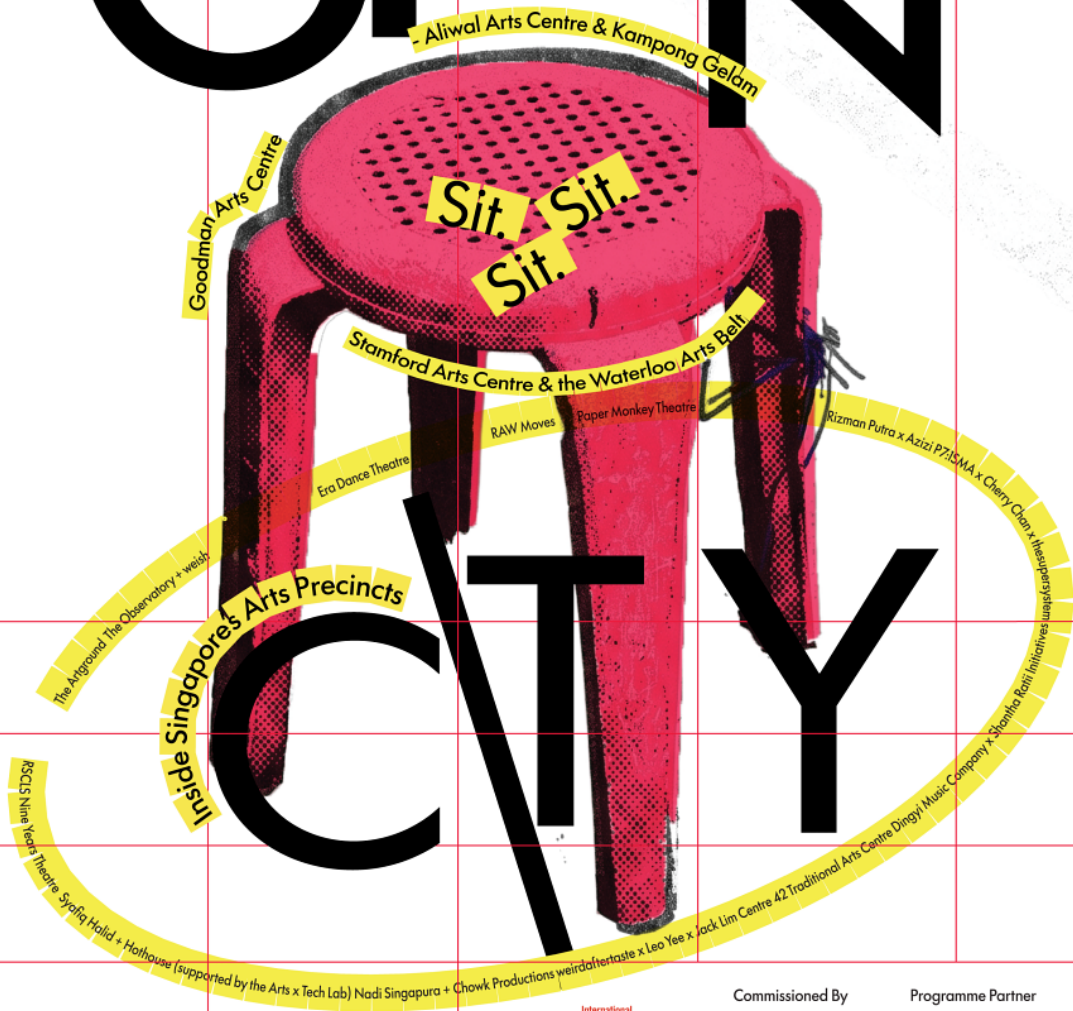

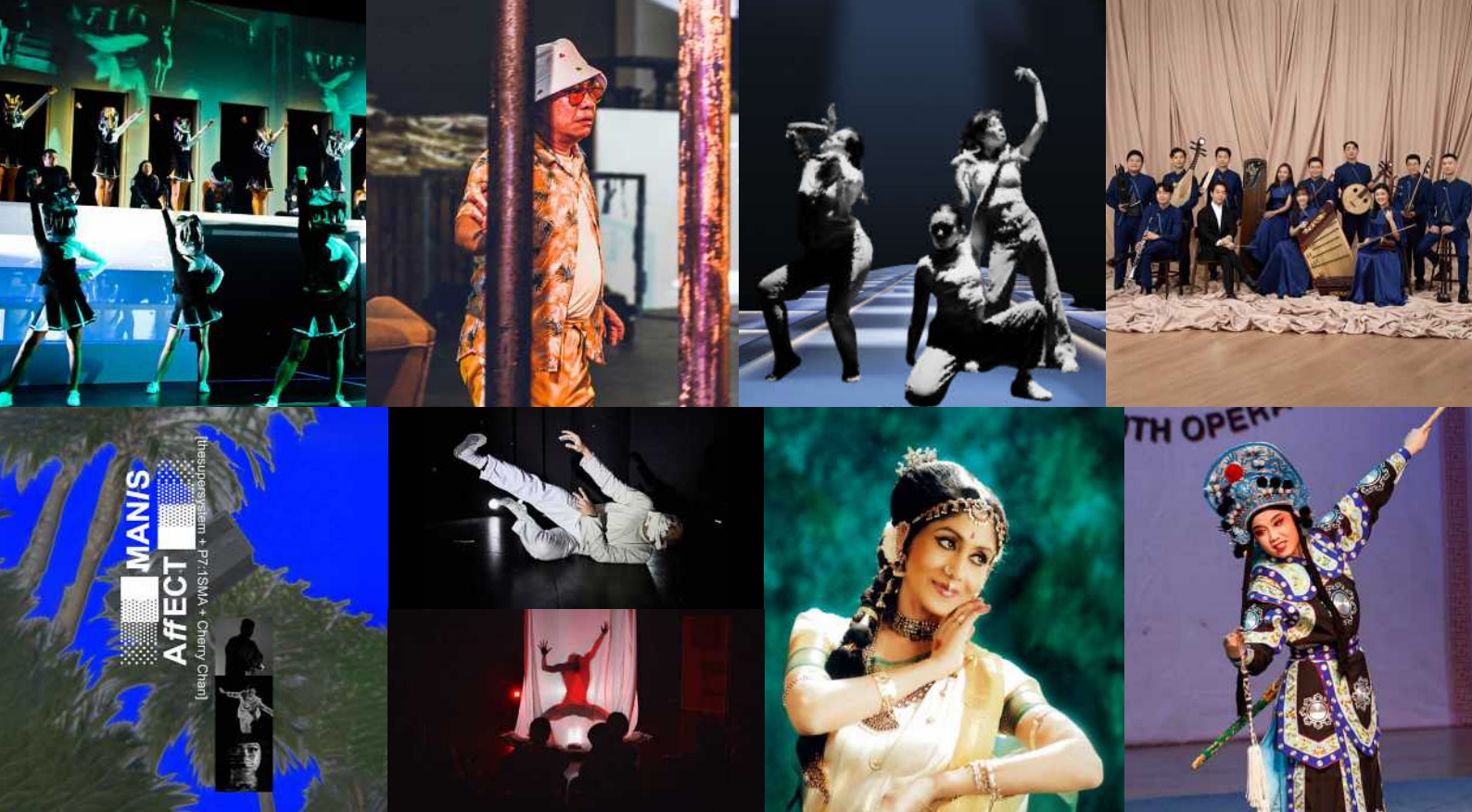

Stamford Arts Centre & Waterloo Arts Belt

The Waterloo district has long carried a sense of porousness. Temples, churches, theatres, schools, and coffee shops exist beside one another. Moving through the neighbourhood means encountering different systems of belief, performance and daily rituals within the span of a few streets.

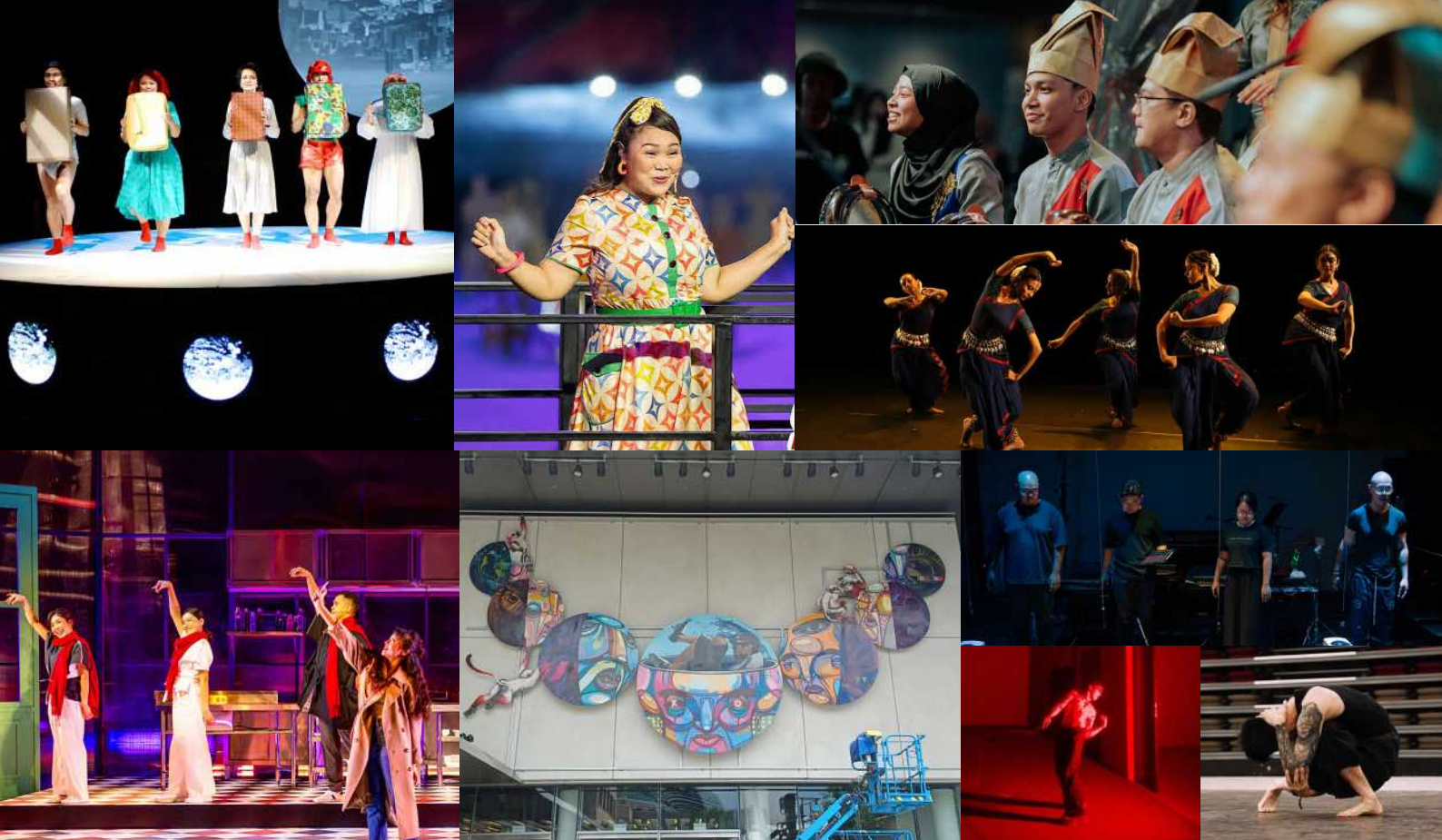
The afternoon opens with a vegetarian lunch by Eight Treasures, whose contemporary approach to Chinese cuisine carries its own conversation between inheritance and reinvention. The route then unfolds through encounters with Centre 42, Shantha Ratii Initiatives, Dingyi Music Company, Traditional Arts Centre, P7:ISMA, Cherry Chan, Heider Ismail, Rizman Putra, Azizi and Julius Foo.

Questions of transmission move quietly through the afternoon. Some artists work through forms carried carefully across generations. Others respond to the present through contemporary performance, sound and visual experimentation. Together, they form a continuum of practices concerned with how embodied knowledge passes from one person to another through continued use, adaptation and care.

Aliwal Arts Centre & Kampong Gelam

Kampong Gelam contains many layers at once: tourist quarter, spiritual centre, food enclave, rehearsal ground. The neighbourhood resists singular readings because so many histories continue to overlap within it. Aliwal Arts Centre reflects that same condition. Within the building, very different artistic languages coexist wall to wall.

The afternoon begins over lunch by Geni Singapore, whose regional Malay cooking speaks to centuries of trade, migration and cultural exchange across the region. The afternoon continues through performances, installations, sound works and interventions by Syafiq Halid and Hothouse supported by the National Arts Council's Arts x Tech Lab Initiative, RSCLS, Nine Years Theatre, weirdaftertaste, Leo Yee, Jack Lim, Nadi Singapura, Chowk Productions and Siti Khalijah.

Different communities occupy the same cultural ecology. The route becomes a way of thinking about Singapore as a continuous act of coexistence.

Goodman Arts Centre stands on land that once faced the sea. Before reclamation redrew the coastline, this part of Singapore opened onto mangroves, river mouths and coastal settlements where seafaring indigenous communities once lived along the water's edge.

The afternoon begins with lunch by Ahimsa Sanctuary, whose plant based cooking draws from Ayurvedic traditions centred on balance, nourishment and care. From there, the route moves through studios, rehearsal rooms and corridors with artists including Era Dance Theatre, Paper Monkey Theatre, RAW Moves, The Artground, The Observatory, weish and Andrew Marko.

A particular quality of attention begins to emerge across the route. These are artists tending to what risks being lost: dance forms carried across generations, ancient storytelling traditions, fading folk songs and geological signals that precede change.

Goodman Arts Centre is managed by Arts House Group.

Janji Kita: Echoes of our Land by Nadi Singapura invites audiences to reflect on shared values, identity, and purpose. The works *Nazam Pribumi* and *The Migration* weave music and movement into a communal experience grounded in the wisdom of the Nusantara.

At its core lies the narrator’s message—*Janji Kita* (Our Promise)—a call to discipline, humility, and responsibility, urging us to guard our actions and intentions while considering what it means to live meaningfully and honour the “*bumi bertuah*” (blessed land). *Nazam Pribumi* opens this reflection through layered rhythms of traditional Malay percussion—reba, kompang, hadrah, and jidur—interlaced with the Minangkabau talempong.

In *The Migration*, this call is answered as performers move in unison, embodying journeys of people and culture across time, dissolving boundaries between performer and audience. Through this work, Nadi Singapura brings tradition into contemporary spaces, ensuring the promises of the Nusantara remain alive and resonant today for future generations.

Conceived as a cross-cultural collaboration, *Bridges in Motion* celebrates artistic diplomacy, shaped by the unique friendship and creative exchange between Singapore and Malaysia. It is an exploration of interconnectedness across people, places, and disciplines.

It features a 15-minute re-staging of selected excerpts from the original 70-minute cine-concert, centred on the theme “*Same Same, And Different*”. It distills moments of convergence and contrast, where shared cultural vocabularies unfold into distinct contemporary expressions, reflecting on identity, exchange, and coexistence. Blending live orchestration, dance, experimental soundscapes, and costumes, the production brings together over 50 emerging collaborators from traditional and electric-fusion backgrounds.

Bridges in Motion was first presented at the Triennial Cultural Showcase 2025—a flagship bilateral initiative marking 60 years of cultural and diplomatic ties between Singapore and Malaysia, organised by Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth of Singapore (MCCY) in collaboration with Malaysia’s Ministry of Tourism, Arts and Culture (MOTAC).

Last Rites **Liu Xiaoyi / Emergency Stairs (Singapore)**

School of the Arts (SOTA) Studio Theatre

Last Rites brings together five veteran performance artists from across Asia in a new cross-cultural and cross-disciplinary theatrical work exploring endings, legacy and artistic immortality.

Built from intimate interviews with the artists – whose average age is 74 – the piece reflects on their original callings, personal struggles and philosophies on art and life, rather than depicting death directly. Their stories trace decades of perseverance, conviction and cultural exchange: from Yang Shi Bin's bond with mentor Kuo Pao Kun and Jung Dong-hwan's belief in treating every performance as his last, to Nam Geung-ho's radical street performances, Kanji Shimizu's reflections on life and death through Noh, and Didik Nini Thowok's advocacy for cross-cultural understanding despite discrimination.

Blurring the boundaries between the virtual and the real, memory and imagination, *Last Rites* asks a poignant question: after everything ends, can an artist's spirit live on through performance?

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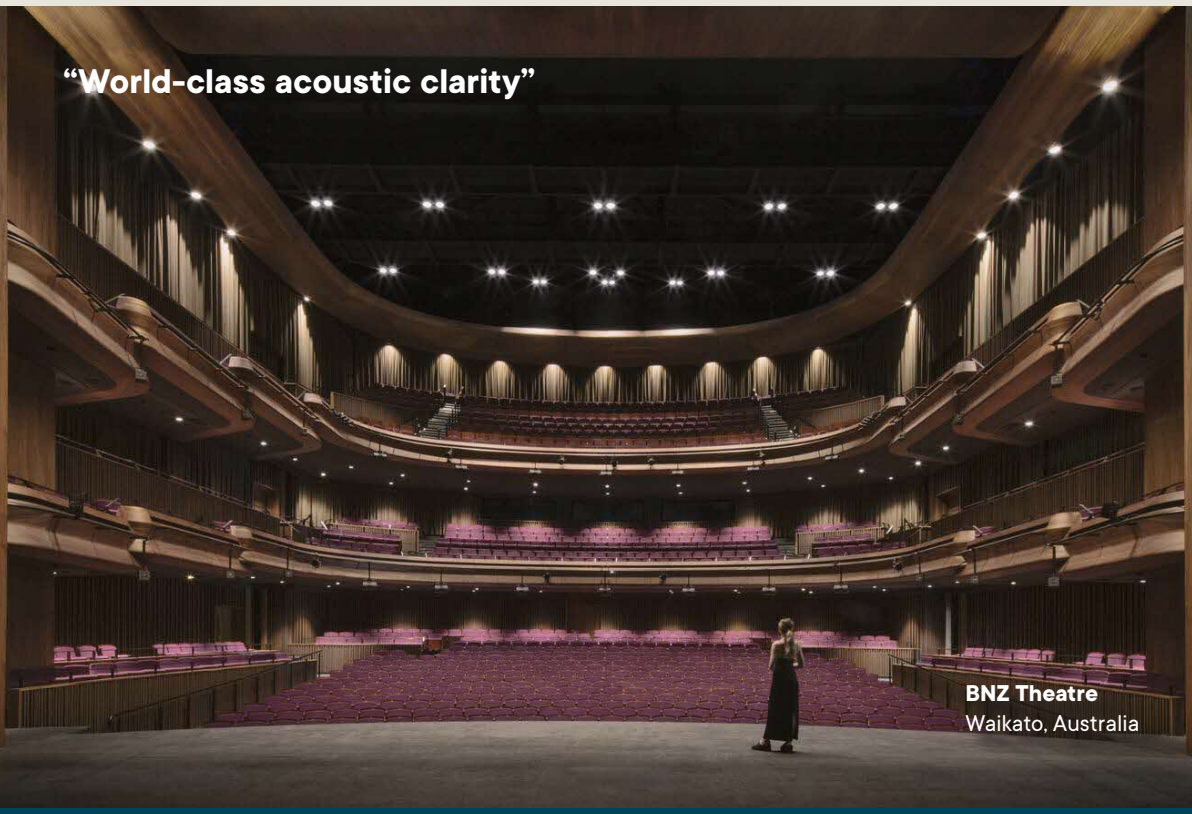
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
