



SUSTAIN THE ARTS (stART) FUND OPEN CALL GUIDELINES

What is the stART Fund?

The Sustain the Arts (stART) Fund is an initiative by the National Arts Council (NAC), supported by the private sector to boost the long-term sustainability of small arts organisations, and to nurture a culture of giving to the arts.

It is the first arts philanthropic fund launched and administered by NAC in 2021 to help arts organisations, which have limited resources to scale up and establish robust governance structures. It also aims to help small arts organisations create and present quality programmes that contribute to the vibrancy of Singapore's arts and culture ecosystem. Such programmes include those with community impact that enable more people to enjoy the arts, enhance the arts experience through digital technology, and encourage audiences to reflect on and celebrate Singapore's cultural identity. In addition, the stART Fund aims to catalyse giving and develop organisational capabilities of small arts organisations, ensuring that they are better equipped to sustain their practice for the long-term.

What does the stART Fund Support?

The stART Fund supports arts organisations, which have yet to attain Institutions of Public Character (IPC) status, and meet the following criteria:

- Registered with the Commissioner of Charities (COC), Accounting and Corporate Regulatory Authority (ACRA) or the Registry of Societies (ROS); and
- Total Operating Expenditure (TOE) of less than \$1 million.

Eligible art organisations can receive funding from the stART Fund through either one of the two tracks: **Organisation funding** or **Programme funding**

- For **organisation funding**, awarded arts organisations would receive funding from the stART Fund to help scale-up their organisations to attain a Charity and/or IPC status.
- For **programme funding**, arts organisations would submit their proposals for one or more of the following stART Donors' awards. [Refer to Table 1 on donors' interest areas]

Proposed projects can take place in one of the following formats:

- Physical
- Digital
- Combination of physical and digital platforms

All digital presentations must adhere to NAC's funding guidelines and [IMDA's Internet Code of Practice](#).

Digital content should be suitable for the general public, with priority given to projects that are appropriate for [General Audience](#) viewing. Applicants are encouraged to consider inclusive practices such as subtitling, close-captioning and sign language services to cater to diverse audiences.

Table 1: Programme Track - Donors' Award

Award	Areas of support
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The Dymon Asia Emerging Artists Award	Emerging artists and their Singapore gallerists to participate in residencies and strong presentation platforms.
The Yong Hon Kong Foundation Inclusive Arts Award	Programmes that bring the arts to underserved communities such as seniors, people with disabilities and special needs and youth-at-risk.
Pierre Lorinet Arts Award	Performing arts (theatre and dance), literary arts, visual arts, and traditional arts.
The Lyman Fund	Traditional Chinese arts organisations.
UOB Digital Art Award	Development of digital art and new talents beyond traditional visual art formats to embrace the vibrant, burgeoning digital art stage.
ToteBoard	For arts organisation to scale-up their organisation status to charity/IPC status and support programmes that bring the arts to the communities.

What is the level of funding support under stART Fund?

The quantum for each grant under the stART fund is estimated to be between \$20,000 to \$50,000 for each programme and/or organisation.

Each proposal should reflect:

- The artistic strength of your proposed project;
- Your project’s reach and quality of public engagement;
- Your ability to execute the project;
- A realistic estimate of your budget

Projects proposed by for-profit entities must have significant development benefits for Singaporean artists, bring high quality arts to audiences and should achieve financial sustainability with time. In addition, we will prioritise funding to companies whose core business is in the arts.

What are the assessment criteria?

The application will be assessed in the following criteria:

Who is not eligible to apply for stART Fund?

NAC will not be able to support the application if the group/organisation:

- Has attained Institutions of Public Character (IPC) status;
- Proposed project has already commenced prior to the time of approval and taking place before 3rd July 2023.
- does not have a clearly defined arts component, including projects primarily aimed at promoting religious causes;
- Is held at a religious venue;
- Is not intended for public consumption;
- Is intended for fundraising purposes;
- Is presented under the auspicious of a school or tertiary institution, or is part of its curriculum;
- Is intended specifically for academic purposes;
- Have pending/outstanding:
 - Evaluation reports on the use of previous grants from NAC;
 - Debts with NAC (you are eligible to apply once you have cleared your outstanding debts).

A note on Funding Guidelines

While we celebrate diversity of expression and open, balanced dialogue in the arts, as a statutory body disbursing funds in line with Government policies, NAC has to prioritise funding to proposals which do not:

- Advocate or lobby for lifestyles seen as objectionable by the general public;
- Denigrate or debase a person, group or class of individuals on the basis of race or religion, or serve to create conflict or misunderstanding in our multicultural and multi-religious society;
- Undermine the authority or legitimacy of the government and public institutions, or threaten the nation's security or stability.

Intellectual Property, Copyright and Royalties

Applicants are to ensure that their projects do not infringe the Intellectual Property (IP) rights of others.

Submission

How do I apply for the stART Fund?

You will need to complete and submit your application to the stART Fund Secretariat via email <stART@nac.gov.sg> with the following information:

1. Proposal template (Annex A)
2. Budget template (Annex B)
3. CV of key parties involved (e.g. artistic director, cast members, designers, stage manager etc)
4. Samples of work (for first time applicants or if requested by NAC)
5. For Theatre and Literary Arts projects, including Festivals, the submission of complete scripts/manuscripts is required upon application.

Notification

The grant is open for application once a year. The table below lists the key dates and windows that you will need to adhere to for your application:

Please note that you can submit an application or your project at any point before the ‘apply by’ date indicated in tables above.

All applications have to be submitted by 1700hrs on the closing date. Late applications will not be accepted.

All applications will be rigorously assessed by NAC and you may be contacted via email if more information is required. Your application will either be assessed by an internal team or by a combination of internal and donor assessors. All proposals submitted to the Council will be treated in the strictest confidence.
